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Conference format

The discussions in the thematic sessions 31 March -1 April build upon a comprehensive set of national reports exploring the museum making process in European states with a set of comparative questions. The main comparative themes relates to the role of the active agents, the challenges that they faced and face, the visions manifested through their strategies, the integrative thrust of the museum structure (centre-periphery, state-nation) and the consequences of the museum-making in relation to the making of states and national identities. These themes will **firstly** be assessed comparatively. The sessions are divided into one set arranged due to the overarching path of the state-making process: empires, early small-state establishment and 20th century dynamics. The other set answers questions of the chronology and function of various types of museums, here concentrated to history and art museums.

In the sessions, a discussant will address aspects of all, or part of, the reports in an introduction of one hour which will be followed by a one hour discussion with all participants to respond and discuss the use and interpretation of the reports. That discussion can be used both by authors to enhance their papers to finalize the conference proceedings and for the discussants to fine-tune their comparative arguments.

Structuring the conference in this way might lead us to miss important observations. Hence, **secondly**, all participants will be asked to keep an open mind through the conference to what general aspects of museums and identity politics they think would be worth treating in the conference report and additional book(s) or articles. These suggestions are picked up on the last day of the conference in a concluding panel discussion and a session on publication. The session on publication is for Eunamus participants only.
